DISABILITY ACCOMMODATIONS

This course enables students to improve their writing and critical reading skills, develop an understanding of how cultural events impact literature and media, and help them use critical thinking skills to improve their analysis and argument skills. Additionally, the class puts emphasis on research, showing students how to locate, identify, and cite outside sources to improve their own arguments.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to critically analyze and evaluate American literature texts.
- 2. Analyze the elements and techniques used by authors to convey ideas and messages.
- 3. Explain the historical and cultural contexts that influenced the development of American literature.
- 4. Interpret and analyze various American literature forms, including but not limited to short stories, poetry, and novels.
- 5. Identify and describe the major themes and motifs present in American literature texts.
- 6. Develop original interpretations and perspectives on American Literature texts supported by evidence and analysis.
- 7. Organize and develop essay drafts with correct formatting and ideas expressed in clear, concise, and correct English.
